I. SITUATION OVERVIEW

Typhoon (TY) "LANDO" with International Name "KOPPU" has entered the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) in the afternoon of 14 October 2015.

At about 1:00 AM, 18 October 2015, TY "LANDO" has made landfall over Casiguran, Aurora and has remained almost stationary.

Typhoon "LANDO" continues to move slowly towards the regions of Cordillera and Ilocos.

At 10:00 PM, the eye of Typhoon "LANDO" was located based on all available data in the vicinity of Tinoc, Ifugao with maximum sustained winds of 130 kph near the center and gustiness of up to 160 kph. It is forecasted to move North Northwest at 5 kph. Public Storm Warning Signal (PSWS) No. 3 is raised in the Provinces of Benguet, Ilocos Sur, Ilocos Norte, La Union and Abra; PSWS No. 2 is raised in Cagayan including Pangasinan, Zambales, Nueva Vizcaya, Ifugao, Mountain Province, Apayao, and Tarlac; PSWS No. 1 is hoisted in Bataan, Pampanga, Bulacan, Nueva Ecija, Northern Quezon, Quirino, Aurora, Isabela, Cagayan including Calayan and Babuyan Group of Islands, Batanes, and Metro Manila.

Stormy weather is expected over Metro Manila, Ilocos Region, Cagayan Valley, Cordillera, Central Luzon and the province of Rizal and Northern Quezon including Polillo Islands. Rains with gusty winds will prevail over Batanes, Cavite, Laguna, Batangas and rest of Quezon. Cloudy skies with light to moderate rains will be experienced over Visayas, Zamboanga Peninsula and the rest of Luzon. Partly cloudy to cloudy skies with isolated thunderstorms will prevail over the rest of Mindanao.

Moderate to strong winds blowing from the northeast to northwest will prevail over the rest of Luzon and coming from the southwest over Visayas and Mindanao with moderate to rough seas.

II. EFFECTS

A. AFFECTED POPULATION (TAB A) and PRE-EMPTIVE EVACUATION (TAB B)

1. A total of **4,892 families or 20,492 persons** were affected in Regions I, II, III, IV-A, V, and CAR. Of this number, **1,830 families or 6,776 persons** were pre-emptively evacuated.

POWER SUPPLY (TAB E)

1. Power interruptions / outages were reported in [four \(4\) cities and seventy-one \(1\) municipalities](#) in Regions I, II, III, IV-A, IV-B and CAR.
2. Province-wide power outages still remain in Quirino, Nueva Vizcaya, Aurora, Apayao, and Kalinga.
3. [As of 18 October 2015, power supply has been restored in five \(5\) cities and forty-eight \(48\) municipalities in Ilocos Norte, Pangasinan, La Union, Cagayan, Isabela, Nueva Ecija, Zambales, Tarlac, Laguna, and Benguet.](#)

COMMUNICATIONS

1. No communication in the Municipalities of Dinalungan, Casiguran, and Dilasag (DiCaDi), Aurora.

TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

1. On 17 October 2015, 5:50 PM, LTFRB RIII and Genesis Transport were advised to suspend operation of buses and mini-buses travelling via Baler, Baler-Cabanatuan / Baguio Routes.
2. [On 18 October 2015, LTFRB advised RORO Bus Operators \(Batangas Route\) and Bus Operators for Regions I, II, IV-A, V to stop operations due to poor weather / sea state conditions.](#)

H. STATUS OF PORTS

SEAPORT (TAB F)

1. A total of [6,529 passengers, 89 vessels, 42 motorized bancas](#), and [633 rolling cargoes](#) are stranded due to rough sea condition caused by TY "LANDO".

III. DISASTER PREPAREDNESS (TAB H)

4. Activated volunteer groups for Search, Rescue and Retrieval (SRR) and Rapid Emergency Telecommunications Team (RETT).
5. Activated Emergency Response Information Center (ERIC).
6. On 18 October 2015, Response Cluster Meeting was held at the NDRRMOC Conference Room and was presided by DSWD ASec. Vilma Cabrera.
7. AFP, BFP and Volunteer Search and Rescue Groups were deployed to flooded areas for SAR operations on 18 October 2015.
