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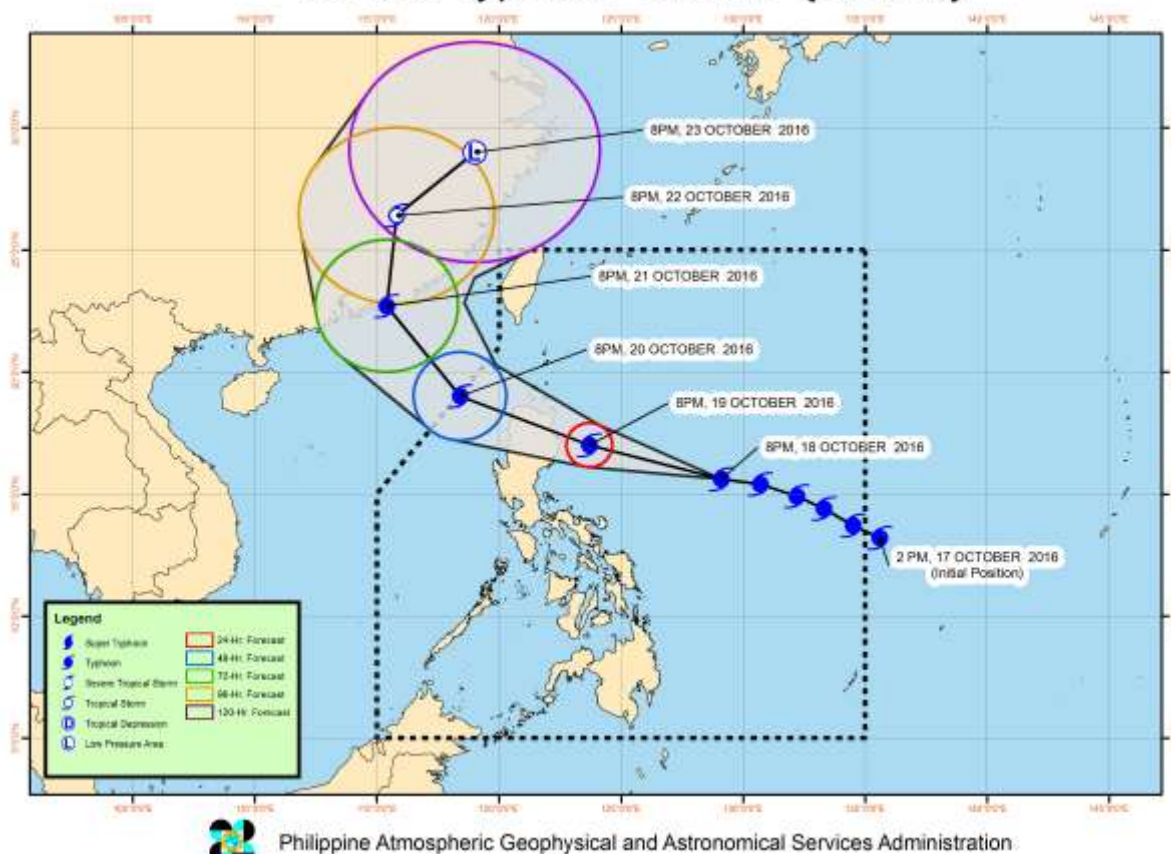

Weather Bulletin

Track of Typhoon "LAWIN" {HAIMA}



At 10PM October 18, 2016, the eye of Typhoon "LAWIN" (HAIMA) was located based on all available data at **755 km East of Baler of Aurora (15.7°N, 128.6°E)**, with maximum sustained winds of up to 195 kph near the center and gustiness of up to 240 kph. It is forecast to move West Northwest at 25 kph.

Forecast / Positions Outlook:

- 24 Hour (This evening October 19): 190 km East Northeast of Casiguran, Aurora
- 48 Hour (Thursday evening): 250 km West Northwest of Laoag City
- 72 Hour (Friday evening): 725 km West Northwest of Basco, Batanes (outside PAR)
- 96 Hour (Saturday evening): 915 km Northwest of Basco, Batanes (outside PAR)
- 120 Hour (Sunday evening): 1,000 km North Northwest of Basco, Batanes (outside PAR)

Status of Prepositioned Resources: Stockpile and Standby Funds

The Central Office (CO), Field Offices (FOs) and National Resource Operations Center (NROC) have a total stockpile and standby funds amounting to **₱1,476,148,428.59** breakdown as follows:

a. Standby Funds

There is a total of **₱717,878,547.17** standby funds at the CO and FOs. Of the said amount, **₱667,046,820.40** is the available Quick Response Fund at the CO.

b. Stockpiles

There is also a total of **505,617** Family Food Packs (FFPs) amounting to **₱182,520,035.90** and available Food and Non-Food Items (FNFI) amounting to **₱575,749,845.50**.

	<p>(DRMT) and the Social Welfare and Development Teams and stressed on the crucial roles and functions of the team leaders and members along disaster monitoring, provision of technical assistance, coordination, data generation and data analysis and if needed, to augment in the relief distribution;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Disaster Management and Response Teams are still on duty to monitor the effects of Typhoon Karen and the possible swelling of the tributaries of the Cagayan River due to the on-going release of waters of the Magat Dam. • All Municipal Action Team (MAT) members and Provincial Action Team (PAT) members were instructed to be on their respective area of assignment starting 18 October 2016 for close monitoring and coordination with the P/C/MDRRMCs. • As a local practice, the FO has been operationalizing the designation of Provincial Disaster Coordinators per province in the persons of division chiefs whose major task is to ensure that what are expected in the SWAD and in MATS in disaster management is efficiently implemented and to ensure that disaster management processes are effectively carried out through converged efforts. • DSWD-FO II has been continuously coordinating with the RDRRMC.

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Logistics Facilities

- 1) There are 18 DSWD Regional Warehouses maintaining Family Food Packs (FFPs) for prepositioning at the Local Government Units (LGUs).

- 2) Two (2) Disaster Response Center Hubs with mechanized packing system are ready to augment to affected regions. These are:
 - a) The NROC located in Pasay City, Metro Manila which maintains 100,000 FFPs
 - b) The Visayas Disaster Response Center in Cebu City which also maintains 100,000 FFPs
- c) Seven (7) Pilot Evacuation Centers cum Multi-Purpose Building are constructed in Regions I, II, III, IV-A, V, VI and CARAGA and readily available for the said purpose. These are located in:
 - a) **Region I** – Brgy. Maninding, Santa Barbara, Pangasinan
 - b) **Region II** – Provincial Engineering Office Cmpd., Ilagan City, Isabela
 - c) **Region III** – Brgy. San Isidro, Magalang, Pampanga
 - d) **CALABARZON** – Brgy. Duhat, Santa Cruz, Laguna
 - e) **Region V** – Brgy. San Jose, Malilipot, Albay
 - f) **Region VI** – Oton, Iloilo
 - g) **CARAGA** – Brgy. Bancasi, Butuan City

Human Resource Capacity
